



Alumni become new members of the Hoover Hall of Fame



Doctor Sandra Whipple Spanier, a 1969 graduate, was inducted into the Hall of Fame on September 1. Spanier was a part of Hoover's first graduating class. While at Hoover, Sandra was involved in student council, inter-school relations, pep club, Red Cross, Future Homemakers of America, drama and golf.



Charles Zanders, class of 1987, was inducted into the Hall of Fame during the Hoover-Roosevelt boys' basketball game January 19. "I'm here as a guest tonight," he said. "But I committed 17 years of my blood, sweat and tears to this Hoover community. Thank you so much for this tremendous honor."



During the Hoover-Dowling boys' basketball game February 13, class of 1985 graduate Colonel Todd Jacobus was inducted into the Hall of Fame. Jacobus went to Samuelson Elementary and Meredith Middle School.



Tomas DeAngelo, class of 1971 was inducted April 25. At Hoover, he received letters in track, baseball and football. He was a member of student council and graduated in the top 3% of his class. After graduating, DeAngelo became a successful architect earning the distinction, "Fellow of the American Institute of Architects" in 2005.



2002 graduate Katie Meade was inducted into the Hall of Fame April 25th. During her time at Hoover, Meade participated in the 1999 Special Olympics, winning a gold medal in balance beam. While working as an ambassador for Best Buddies in 2006, she became the face of "Fearless" hair products. Meade is widely considered to be "the first model with Down Syndrome to become the face of a beauty camazinn."
