A SUPER BOWL TO REMEMBER

n Feb. 11 2024, Super Bowl LVIII took place for the first time in Las Vegas, Nevada at Allegiant Stadium. They drove inside the 10-yard line before a pass to Mecole Hardman gave Kansas City the win, 25-22.

Although the closeness of Kansas City to Iowa made the Chiefs seem favorable, Iowans should have remembered to give love to the Iowa and Iowa State athletes George Kittle and Brock Purdy. Kittle is number 85 and a tight end while Purdy is number 13 and a quarterback, both for the 49ers. They both were outstanding and deserve some love.
